Table 2: [Corrected] Key Appraisals Themes of Fear & Anger

Appraisal Dimension	Fear	Anger
<i>Certainty</i> Degree to which future events seem predictable and comprehensible (high) or unpredictable and incomprehensible (low).	Low	High
<i>Control</i> Degree to which events seem to be brought about by individual agency (high) or situational agency (low).	Low	High
<i>Responsibility</i> Degree to which someone or something other than oneself (high) or oneself (low) seems responsible.	Medium	High
